Reducing Recidivism Through Collaboration

The Ohio Justice Alliance for Community Correction's 25th Annual Conference will be held at the Crowne Plaza North Hotel in Columbus, Ohio on October 13th and 14th, 2011. As OJACC's 25th Anniversary celebration, this year's theme is "Reducing Recidivism through Collaboration" and highlights include presentations on recent successes, research and promoting practices in community corrections.

To celebrate a significant milestone in Ohio Community Corrections Policy, our opening keynote speakers will include Director Mohr, Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction and Marc Pelka, Senior Policy Analyst, from the Council of State Governments, addressing sentencing reform, elements and intended effects of H.B.86 and the state's justice reinvestment initiative. This year OJACC has partnered with Treatment Alternative to Street Crime (TASC) to offer workshops addressing juvenile justice, criminal justice and behavioral health.

Workshops include presentations related to changing offender behavior with a focus on motivational interviewing, case planning, supervision strategies to enhance implementation

of evidence based practices, risk, needs and dosage, sex offender treatment and specialty docket courts. Behavioral health workshops will address medication-assisted treatment, street drugs and opiate specific approaches. Juvenile workshops will focus on effective programs reducing disproportionate minority contact, the OYAS, and impact of H.B.86 on the juvenile justice system.

In closing, motivational speaker David Rastoka will provide us with 10 Rules to a Happy Life with a focus on how to be better listeners, supervisors and communicators with family, co-workers and individuals and how to set realistic life goals that will ultimately lead to a fuller appreciation of life, work and family.

For the fifth year, the ODRC Clifford Skeen Awards will be presented in conjunction with the OJACC Achievement Awards luncheon.

Shaping the Future of Ohio's Justice System

Marc Pelka and Jennifer Pealer, Council of State Governments, Director Gary Mohr, Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction



This general session will discuss the evolutionary development and impact of The Council of State Government's "Justice Reinvestment in Ohio" report and its connection to Ohio's sentencing reform legislation known as House Bill 86. Signed into law by Governor Kasich on June 29, 2011, HB 86 incorporated the policy framework outlined in "Justice Reinvestment in Ohio" report as well as additional reforms. Policy makers believe the legislation is critical to stemming the growth in Ohio's prison population, easing overcrowding and improving public safety. The session will feature two speakers and start with a special introduction by Ohio Supreme Court Justice Evelyn Lundberg Stratton. In addition to her introductory comments, Justice Stratton will outline the Ohio Supreme Court's role in the justice reinvestment initiative and HB 86. As the first speaker, Gary C. Mohr, Director of the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections will discuss the elements and intended effect of HB 86. As the session's keynote, Marc Pelka, Senior Policy Analyst for the Council of State Governments will articulate the connection between the "Justice Reinvestment in Ohio" report and H.B. 86, as well as provide

information regarding Phase 2 of the implementation strategy. This session promises to provide policy makers and practitioners with information that is sure to impact the future direction of Ohio's corrections and community corrections systems.

(1-A) Parent Project® - A No Nonsense Guide to Parenting Tough Teens

Lisa Lemaster and Katherine Murray, Delaware County Juvenile Court

Parent Project® is a training program that provides education, guidance, and support for parents of strong-willed or out-of-control adolescent children. In this program, parents are provided tools for effective parenting and are given the opportunity to rehearse these skills in a supportive environment. Parents who have completed the program have said they enjoy the "laid back, fun learning atmosphere" and feel they have "learned a lot about handling my child." In this session, participants will learn more Parent Project® and how the Delaware community was able to successfully implement the program. Role plays demonstrating Parent Project® skills will be included in the presentation.

(2-A) Responding to Violations Through Evidence-Based Practices: When Positive Reinforcers are not Enough (COB)

Lori Francescon, Franklin County Common Pleas Adult Probation and Michael Anderson, Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction

Probation and Parole are challenged to respond more effectively with violations of

supervision to assist offenders in changing their behavior to reduce recidivism; thus saving the state countless dollars. An effective response to a violation should address the negative behavior in a timely manner and provide the offender assistance in achieving socially acceptable behavior. This workshop highlights a probation department's attempts to address violations through evidence-based practices.

(3-A) Overview of Behavioral Health in Adult and Juvenile Justice

Elizabeth Cornachione, Mental Health Advocacy Coalition

Discussion of research published in "By the Numbers: Developing a Common Understanding for the Future of Behavioral Health Care" regarding adults and youth in Ohio's justice systems with behavioral health needs. The discussion will include an overview of demographics, intake data and spending figures for the mental health caseloads. The presentation includes policy recommendations to improve access to behavioral health services.

(4-A) An Orientation to the "Transition to Independence Process (TIP) Model: Practices for Improving the Outcomes of Young People (Ages 14-29) with Emotional/Behavioral Difficulties" (COB)

Patrice Fetzer, Mental Health & Recovery Services Board of Stark County

This session, through power-point presentation, will provide an overview of the evidence

supported Transition to Independence Process (TIP) system that demonstrates improvement in real-life outcomes for youth and young adults (ages 14-29) with emotional/behavioral difficulties (EBD). The audience will learn how the TIP system encourages young people to explore their interests and futures as related to each of the transition domains: employment and career, education, living situation, personal effectiveness/wellbeing, and community-life functioning. The audience will also learn how the TIP system is operationalized through seven guidelines that drive practice-level activities with young people and provide a framework for program and community systems to support, facilitate, and sustain this effort.

(5-A) What Works and What Doesn't in Reducing Recidivism and How Do You Know If It Is Working (COB)

Anne Connell-Freund, Oriana House

This workshop will provide participants with an overview of the principles of effective correctional interventions and will emphasize the value of employing evidence-based and research-driven practices in planning, administering, and evaluating programs. We will also review practical examples of types of services to offer and outcome measures to ensure fidelity. In addition, we will examine different tools to determine if the services offered are having an impact on offender change.

(6-A) A Team Approach to Addressing Veterans in the Criminal Justice System

Honorable Jerry E. Ault, Fred Brubach, Paul Hutchison, and Toni Johnson Mansfield Municipal Court and Mary K. Gillette, Veterans Administration

This panel will include a Veteran's Court team from Mansfield Municipal Court, including a judge, probation officer, and a probation supervisor who will discuss the genesis of their docket, challenges they have faced in setting up their program, how the program operates, successful interventions and treatments, funding streams, measuring outcomes, and future directions. In addition, the panel will include a Veterans Justice Outreach Coordinator who will discuss resources for Veterans that are available state-wide in all courts.

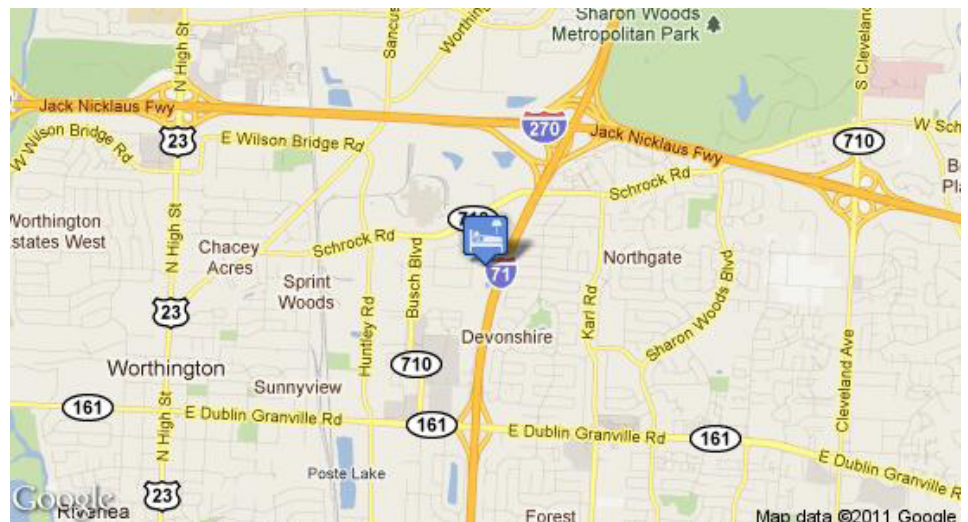

(2-B) The Practical Application of the ORAS: Developing Individualized Case Plans (COB)

Brian Lovins, University of Cincinnati

This workshop will increase practitioners skills in ORAS driven case plans. A structure for case plans will be introduced while sample results of the ORAS will be used to assist participants in developing individualized plans. The ORAS Case Plan within the web system will be reviewed as part of this training.

(3-B) Specialty Dockets: Save Kids and Money

Katie Murray, Delaware County Juvenile Court and Wade Melton, Hardin County Juvenile Court

Research on specialty dockets shows that communities can save money and improve outcomes for youth involved in the juvenile justice system. This presentation will review how implementing a drug court model for juvenile offenders can provide the appropriate supervision and structure to maintain the youth in the community instead of using placements that are much higher in cost, such as detention or residential facilities. In addition to the benefit of reduced costs, the coordination provided by specialty dockets improves the accessibility to and variety of services available to participants.

(4-B) Supervision Strategies to Enhance Implementation and Fidelity to EBP (COB)

Kelly Pitocco, University of Cincinnati

Participants will identify ways they can incorporate implementation of Evidence Based Practices into their existing supervision system to increase the likelihood that staff will remember to use these approaches. The emphasis will be on modeling the approaches we want staff to utilize. Participants will receive examples and models of tools that they can adapt to their system. Included among these will be systems of rating contacts between staff and offenders.

(5-B)) Specialized Dockets Panel: Changing Offender Behavior

This panel will include 2 specialized dockets, the Healthy Options Promoting Empowerment (HOPE) Behavioral Health Court, a misdemeanor level specialty docket in Muskingum County, and the Changing Actions to Change Habits (CATCH) prostitution court from Franklin County Municipal Court. The two specialty dockets will discuss the genesis of their dockets, challenges they have faced in setting up their programs and making them work, how their programs operate, successful interventions and treatments,

funding streams, measuring outcomes, and future directions.

(6-B) Operation Street Smart (Part I)

Shawn Bain, Mike Powell and Steven Tucker, Franklin County Sheriff's Office

This course will provide those working with offenders the most current and up-to-date information on narcotics trends, terminology, paraphernalia, and the physiological effects of narcotics. The course is designed to increase the ability of those working in community corrections to intervene effectively with substance abusing individuals. Participants will learn the street names for common drugs, terms offenders are using, methods of distribution, and prices. The course will also provide the opportunity to touch and see actual examples of current designer street drugs and drug paraphernalia used in camouflaging drug use from parents, probation officers and law enforcement. A strong emphasis is placed on the physiological effects of the drugs and the indicators to look for. Rave drugs, "traditional" drugs and the latest items – K2, Spice and Bath Salts – will all be covered. (1-C) Can We Quantify the Risk Principle? (COB)

Kimberly Sperber, Talbert House

An increasing number of correctional organizations have been working to implement the risk principle into every day practice. While practitioners understand that higher risk offenders should receive more services and supervision than lower risk offenders, they are often challenged with knowing how to quantify how much more services and supervision to provide. This workshop will address this issue by: (1) presenting findings from the existing literature on how many hours of treatment are required to impact low, moderate, and high risk offenders, (2) defining what counts as dosage, and (3) presenting findings from a recently completed dosage study in Ohio involving adult male felons in a Community-Based Correctional Facility.

(2-C) ORAS: Purpose and Benefits (COB)

Kelly Pitocco, University of Cincinnati

This session will outline the reasons for using a risk assessment and the specific strengths of the Ohio Risk Assessment System (ORAS). Participants will learn how the ORAS improves community safety, helps determine needed services for the offender and provides feedback on progress throughout the offender's involvement in the criminal justice system.

(3-C) Ohio Youth Assessment System

Hannah Thomas, Ohio Department of Youth Services

This session will provide an overview of the Ohio Youth Assessment System (OYAS). During the presentation, participants will gain an understanding of the development and implementation of OYAS in Ohio, how the OYAS expands as a youth moves deeper into the Juvenile Justice System, and the benefits of implementing OYAS to practitioners and administrators.

(4-C) HB 86 Impact on Juvenile Justice

Honorable Theresa Dellick, Mahoning County Juvenile Court and Harvey Reed, Ohio Department of Youth Services

HB 86 made sweeping reforms on juvenile justice. The impact and implementation of HB 86 as it affects the juvenile justice system in Ohio will be outlined and discussed.

(5-C) Operation Street Smart – Part II

Those attending this session will become familiar with how the stigma of opiate addiction and medication assisted treatment of opiate dependence creates barriers to mainstream recovery resources. Attending this session you will also gain knowledge about successful approaches combining medication assisted care with 12-step recovery treatment.

(1-D) Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) of Opioid Dependence

*Christina M. Delos Reyes, MD,

County*

Providers will gain an overview of the medications used to assist in the treatment of opioid dependence, including naltrexone, methadone, and buprenorphine. The mechanism of action and the proper dosing for the three types of Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) for opioid dependence will be discussed. Common barriers to using MAT in a variety of treatment settings will also be reviewed. Providers will be encouraged to develop a plan to overcome these barriers.

(2-D) Effective Practices for Working with African-American Youth

Ciphers*

An in-depth example of an effective Disproportionate Minority Confinement (DMC) program. This workshop is interactive, engaging and provides skills, information and practical applications on how Golden Ciphers collaborates with Juvenile Court, schools and community agencies.

This workshop is facilitated by the Founding Executive Director and youth participants sharing their inspirational and transformative journey.

(3-D) Designing and Implementing an Effective Sex Offender Treatment Program from Prison to the Community (COB)

Edward Latessa, Lori Brusman-Lovins, Mindy Schweitzer and Paula Smith, University of Cincinnati

The University of Cincinnati Corrections Institute (UCCI) is working with the Volunteers of America (VOA) and the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC) to develop and implement an evidence-based, cognitive-behavioral treatment program for sex offenders. This effort will include the development of a non-proprietary structured treatment curriculum that will be piloted by the VOA in its residential program in Cincinnati, as well as select ODRC programs (both institutional and community). The UCCI will also work with staff at the pilot sites to design and implement other evidence-based program elements (e.g., assessment protocol, program schedule, behavior modification system, quality assurance mechanisms). The UCCI model includes on-going training, coaching and quality assurance. The workshop will include an overview of the model and process as well as progress to-date.

(4-D) Three Minute MI: Practicing Motivational Interviewing in the Real World (Repeated) (COB)

(5-D) Effective Practices in Correctional Settings-II (EPICS-II) (COB)

Effective Practice in correctional Settings (EPIC) II is a set of supervision techniques used by the corrections professional during interactions with offenders. The techniques help officers build a therapeutic alliance, increase motivation to change, provide an opportunity for change, and hold offenders accountable. The EPICS II techniques are based on existing behavioral change strategies that have been proven effective with offending populations. This workshop identifies and overviews EPICS II skills you can use to facilitate long term change with criminal justice clients. The workshop includes a discussion of the research supporting the use of the skills, a demonstration of many of the skills, and an opportunity for you to practice using demonstrated skills.

(6-D) How to Establish an Effective Reentry Coalition

Edward Little, Cuyahoga County, Executive Office of Health & Human Services, Office of Reentry and Sharon Schnelle, Ohio Office of Criminal Justice Services

In this workshop we will discuss the importance of having a reentry coalition and how to identify key stakeholders to participate in the coalition and understanding local reentry issues.

Presenters will also address reentry at the policy and advocacy level and how to implement best practice programs and how to effectively engage the broader community.
